

## **Sports Premium Funding 2021-2022 £18,140**

At Braywick Court School we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of the children. We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and extra-curricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement all our children.

The government has provided additional funding of over £450 million in the last few years to improve physical education. Our Primary School Sport's funding has enabled us to continue and extend our provision through employing additional sports coaches during PE sessions, contributing to the range of After School clubs provided a wide range which include Dance and Gymnastics to Invictus games which introduce Paralympic sports.

### **What is the Sports Premium?**

The government is providing funding of £150 million per annum. The funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and the money goes directly to primary school Head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children.

#### **Purpose of the funding:**

The premium must be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles.

#### **Impact of Funding:**

Investment in talented, qualified, full-time sports coach has enabled the school to meet its vision of raising the profile of PE and improving the overall health and wellbeing for all children. The funding has significantly benefitted the further development of the Sports Coach allowing CPD in a range of sports and with a particular focus into inclusion. A secondary focus this year has been using the sports premium budget for CPD the new assistant sports coach. This funding has enabled access to a wide range of courses ranging from cricket to gymnastics. The impact of this is the assistant is now able to teach a wide range of sports to a high level. With the confidence and knowledge from these courses our sports coach assistant has been able to run a wide range of afterschool clubs thus increasing opportunity for all pupils.

The sports premium funding has been used throughout the year to help with providing space the school does not have access to. This has been achieved by hiring Braywick Leisure Centre courts daily. This has ensured we can best deliver all KS2 PE lessons as well as insuring that every child gets there 30 active minutes when at school, as recommended by the government. Some of the ways we have used this space effectively this year is by introducing a free sports

programme and squad training at lunchtimes. Free sports and squad training have allowed us to target specific groups to increase their activity levels as well confidence and competence in PE and sport. Particular targeting has been those who would seem inactive coming back from COVID.

This year as seen the return of sporting competitions through the Ascot and Maidenhead partnership as well localised and national fixtures. A particular highlight has been reaching the small school's national finals in Coventry. The sports premium was used to enter and then facilitate participation in this event. We are aware though that sport should be for all and the use of the sports premium has allowed us to focus on SEN competitions throughout the year. This has been through a range of events including the Invictus tournaments and boccia.

### **Swimming:**

We are proud to say that we have managed to recommence the swimming programme for all children. As a school we have given all children the chance to swim weekly. This has had a major impact on the competence of all the children's swimming ability as well as their water confidence. We continue to track and monitor all our pupils swimming progress throughout the years.

			everyone is participating in 30 active minutes at school. Moving onto the next academic year the football spend will still be high with a particular focus on girls football.
CPD	£1500	£1000	Make the necessary provision to ensure that both the sports coach and the assistant sports coach maintain and develop their skills across all aspects of the PE curriculum. These courses will continue to be accessed via the School Sports Partnership and external providers. 2022- 2023 academic year will see the continuation of CPD from external providers allowing both sports coaches to teach a wide range of sports.

Assistant sports coach	£5000	£4000	With the appointment of a new assistant sports coach, we have increased the PE provision for all children. Additionally, we can maximise the use of outdoor space. The children will be able to participate in a greater number of external competitions

			across a wider range of sports.

Braywick leisure centre hire Autumn, Spring & Summer term	£5747	£8742	To have viable space for all pupils to have excellent PE lessons. This space will be used for KS2 for a wide range of topics in PE. We have increased the space so we use it for lunchtimes as well.
