# Sports Premium Funding 2022-2023 £18,140

At Braywick Court School we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of the children. We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and extra-curricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement all our children.

The government has provided additional funding of over £450 million in the last few years to improve physical education. Our Primary School Sport's funding has enabled us to continue and extend our provision through employing additional sports coaches during PE sessions, contributing to the range of After School clubs provided a wide range which include Dance and Gymnastics to Invictus games which introduce Paralympic sports.

#### What is the Sports Premium?

The government is providing funding of £150 million per annum. The funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and the money goes directly to primary school Head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children.

## **Purpose of the funding:**

The premium must be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles.

# **Impact of Funding:**

The Sports Premium funding has had a profound and inclusive impact on every child in our school community, while simultaneously adopting a targeted approach to ensure the specific needs of Special Educational Needs (SEN) and Pupil Premium children are addressed effectively.

For every child, the Sports Premium has created an environment that fosters physical fitness, mental well-being, and social cohesion. All students have enjoyed access to a diverse range of sports activities, state-of-the-art equipment, and well-trained Teachers. As a result, participation rates in sports have increased across the board, encouraging an active and healthy lifestyle among all our students.

Moreover, the targeted approach directed towards SEN and Pupil Premium children has been instrumental in addressing any barriers they may face when engaging in sports. The tailored interventions and additional support have promoted inclusivity, allowing these children to actively participate and reap the benefits of physical activities. By providing appropriate accommodations, specialised coaching, and access to adapted equipment, we have witnessed remarkable progress in their physical and emotional development.

The impact of the Sports Premium on SEN and Pupil Premium children has extended beyond the playing fields. The boost in self-confidence, self-esteem, and social skills among these students has translated into their academic pursuits and overall well-being. The targeted approach has helped bridge achievement gaps, ensuring that all children, regardless of their background, have an equal opportunity to thrive and succeed both in sports and their studies.

Furthermore, the targeted funding has facilitated close collaboration between teachers, coaches, and support staff, fostering a holistic approach to support for SEN and Pupil Premium children. By working together, we have identified their individual strengths and challenges, allowing us to tailor sports activities that cater to their specific needs and preferences.

The Sports premium funding as also allowed for equal access to intra and inter competitions giving all our pupils a chance of representing the school.

### Swimming:

This year, at Braywick Court there has been a successful whole school swimming programme from EYFS to our Year 6 class. The swimming program aimed to improve water confidence, stroke technique, and overall swimming abilities of our Year 6 students. Each student attends for one half term worth of lessons at the local Braywick Leisure centre. The program was designed to cater to varying skill levels, ensuring that all students received personalised attention and support. We are very pleased to announce our results.
